The "Vision Thing" - Studying Divine Intervention

Stanford-Budapest Summer Institute - Budapest session in 2008

The Summer Institute is sponsored by the SIAS group of institutes for advanced study, with the participation of ten European and ten American post-doctoral students (historians, anthropologists and cognitive scientists), working in the field of research on visions. They met first in 2007, at the Center for Advanced Study in the Behavioral Sciences (CASBS), Stanford, and now Collegium Budapest hosts this same group of junior scholars, who are working to better understand visions and their nature and impact in the history of humanity.

The two conveners, Gábor Klaniczay (Rector and Permanent Fellow at Collegium Budapest, Professor of Medieval Studies at the Central European University) and William A.
